Course Description

History of Art – 281 is a survey course, which will examine main developments in Western Art starting from Cave paintings, up to the Renaissance and including a look at Impressionism. The early arts of India and China will also be covered. Emphasis will lie on (1) the meanings and functions assigned to the visual arts during the periods we will be considering and (2) how various characteristics of the works we are looking at – e.g. the 'style', 'subject', in which they were made – related to these prevailing attitudes towards art and its meanings. We will look in particular at works of art that the student will see during their trip to Europe.

Ms. Thereza Spanos holds an M.F.A. in Fine Art (Painting) and Philosophy from The University of Chicago, Chicago, Illinois, U.S.A and a B.F.A. in Fine Art with a minor in the culture and philosophy of Ancient China and Japan from Cornell University, Ithaca, New York, U.S.A.

Ms. Spanou has exhibited her work extensively and globally as well as representing Cyprus in a number of Biennales. She is on a number of committees including the 1% Enrichment of Public Buildings with works of Art, with the Ministry of Education and Culture. She is also a founding member of ARTALK. Ms. Spanou has published a number of articles and critiques on art and international artists, gives many lectures on her own personal research and on art and visual perception and cognition to many educational and private institutions. She has created and developed an arts and interactive arts curriculum which has been adopted by various private elementary schools in Cyprus. Ms. Spanou is currently writing a book.

- 2. To gain a basic understanding of how art as an integral function of society exposes a society unto itself.
- 3. To promote discussion and reflection.
- 4. To encourage the spirit of research and learning whilst gaining a lifelong appreciation of art.
- 5. An encouragement to undertake a journey of self-exploration through art.

During this course, students will have to complete a series of short course assignments, projects and journals.

Course Assignments

Students will visit some of the most important art museums in the Western world over the course of their semester. (this occurs in addition to their classroom contact hours). Before museum visits, they will be given specific assignments relating to individual or comparative reaction and analysis of certain works in the museum that they are visiting. These assignments will be collected and graded.
