This course is an introduction to the history of Modern Europe. Beginning with the French revolution an analysis of the major events and developments of European history will be conducted. Special emphasis will be given to the development of political thought and the different ideologies which shaped European history from the Enlightenment until today.

Tasks and Assignments

Students must complete two class presentations and one essay judged for their presentation and arguments, mastery of literature, critical assessment, analysis of arguments, originality and clarity.

Essay

3000 words, minimum six different sources, inclusive of footnotes and bibliography. The essay topic should be selected from the weekly schedule. All papers must be typed. Plagiarism (including from internet/multi-media encyclopedias) will result in immediate failure of the entire course. Students will also be required to make two class presentations. The deadline for the essay selected from the topic list is three weeks after the presentation. Incomplete course work will result in the failure of the entire course.

Essays are judged and marked according to the following criteria:

- Cogency of presentation and argument
- Mastery of the literature
- Critical assessment of literature search
- Analysis of contending arguments
- Originality and clarity
