Course Description

Early and medieval Christian Thought focuses upon the development of Christian thinking from the apostolic times to the eve of the Protestant Reformation. It centers on those individuals of the period who influenced thinking and practice in their as well as subsequent times. It also focuses upon important historical, social and political events that interacted with Christian doctrines throughout the centuries.

GLS students taking this course will have a chance to visit important Christian historical sites in Cyprus such as the St. Lazarus church, the St. Barnabas church and tomb, Salamina and Pafos where Sts. Paul and Barnabas preached Christianity, several UNESCO churches and at least one monastery. In addition, students will visit Athens, Rome, Rhodes (home of the Crusaders), the island of Patmos, where St. John wrote the book of the Apocalypse, and other religious and historical sites. The purpose of these visits is for the students to put their knowledge of Early Christianity in a real-life perspective.

- c) the early heretical movements
- d) the role of the Church Fathers in the formulation of the Christian faith
- e) Byzantine and Latin Christendom, and
- f) how different trends and movements have developed in Christianity.
