Course Aims and Objectives

This course aims to introduce students to an understanding of the importance of cultural differences, by examining two societies in depth, and two other cultural regions through selected topics. The in-depth studies include the Christian fishing community of Mukkuvar, in Kerala, S. India, and an examination of the condition of children in Bangladesh. The other two regions are Papua New Guinea, and Europe. The course also engages with dynamic change in cultures, and emphasizes the non-static, and non-bounded character of cultural systems, and their propensity to incorporate new ideas, new products, and new practices by contact with change agents from other cultures. The course works thematically through certain issues which occur universally, driven by biology, in the human life cycle, but stresses the different ways these present themselves in different cultures. At the start are beliefs about human conception and reproduction. Food, shelter, childhood, initiation, sexual maturation, courtship and marriage, initiation rituals, the character of exchange systems, [social and economic] with a focus on the giving of gifts; politics, religion and the management of death complete the course.

Teaching Methods

Interactive lectures; student summary presentations of required readings; discussions; films where appropriate;
