Course Description

The course is designed to enable students to continue the study of gradually more complex functional and spatial systems and to explore how public spaces represent their social purpose and importance in the modern city, to their occupants as well as to the outside world. The design of larger scale spaces is studied with an emphasis on planning buildings for education. Students are asked to respond to the notion that an educational building may mediate between the scale of humans (in some cases small ones) and that of the city.
