Course Aims and Objectives

The course aims at providing a background on the most controversial issues related to the contemporary history, that directly affected the evolution of international politics after the WWII. It will start by examining the concept of the balance of power and how its breakdown led to World War II. The focus will then turn to the Cold War that was the bitter legacy of WWII. The Students will look at the major conflicts of the period, and at how US – Soviet relations influenced their course. The emergence of institutions and alliances will be examined and the course will also address the challenges of the new world system that is emerging in the post-Cold War era.

Teaching Methods

Lectures, discussions, assigned readings, projects, & video films.
