The course includes the following topics: Introduction to textual criticism: the folios and quartos, Shakespeare's sources, Influences of Shakespeare, Shakespeare and his contemporaries, Politics and the stage, Shakespeare as history, Dramatic and non-dramatic verse, The Sonnets and inwardness of characterization, Tragedy: definitions and problems, History of Criticism: Johnson to Bloom, The influence of Shakespeare and canon formation, Modern interpretations of Shakespeare

## **Course Aims and Objectives**

The focus of the course is both on Shakespeare's dramatic works and his non-dramatic poetry, especially the sonnets. The student will also be introduced to existing critical material and theories and will be expected to formulate their own critical responses to the plays. Of particular emphasis will be Shakespeare's place within the literary canon, and his influence upon subsequent writers.

## **Teaching Methods**

Facilities are available for PowerPoint lecture presentations, VCRs, Online Computers, Computer Labs. Teachers may also use a mix of lectures, tutorials, case studies, student presentations, group work, role play, literature review, analysis of research data, and field visits and have visiting specialists give lectures.
