Course Description

The course is designed to examine the historical and institutional evolution of law in Cyprus and its adaptation and operation in modern Cypriot society. The early elements of law will be discussed reaching back to early antiquity, Hellenistic and the Roman periods. Furthermore, the evolution of Byzantine law in Cyprus will be examined until the twelfth century, as well as the meaning of the Byzantine codification in Cyprus. Regarding the Frankish period, special emphasis will be given to the Assizes of Cyprus;' some principles of Ottoman law will be examined within the framework of Ottoman rule in Cyprus. The application of common law in Cyprus will be examined in detail, beginning with British rule. The current legal norms in present day Cyprus will be traced back to their origins, a critique of the situation and opinions will be discussed extensively with respect to present and future situations.
