- 2. The institutions of the Community and the EU;
- 3. The relationship between EC law and national law, including the principles of supremacy, subsidiary and proportionality;
- 4. Community legislation, including all sources of law, and policy-making;
- 5. The nature and application of EU law in Member States, Members States liability and remedies in national courts;
- 6. Preliminary rulings and the building of a European judicial system;
- 7. Challenging Community acts through the review of legality
- 8. The liability of the Community

Course Aims and Objectives

The course aims to introduce the student to the background and evolution of the European Union, to familiarize the student with its institutions and legislation, to explore the relationship between EU law and member states' law, and to consider the functioning of the judiciary.
