Topic Areas

- 1. Foundations of International Law: Historical, sociological and ethical background. Characteristics. Law creating processes and law determining agencies. International law and municipal law.
- 2. The principle of sovereignty: Independence and equality of states. Forms of sovereignty especially territorial and personal jurisdiction. Acquisition and loss of territorial sovereignty. Jurisdiction over individuals, corporations, ships and aircraft. Limitations of territorial and personal jurisdiction; state and diplomatic immunities, human rights.
- 3. The principle of recognition: Meaning and functions of recognition, especially international personality types of recognition. Non recognition.
- 4. The principle of consent: Treaties. Other types of consensual engagements. Unilateral acts.
