#### **Course Aims and Objectives**

Will evaluate and consider the works of 19th/20th century theorists. The main theme of the semester will be the transition from modernism to post-modernism. The semester will conclude by examining the important impact that feminist jurisprudence has had on the subject in recent years.

The course is delivered through a mixture of lectures, discussions, and presentations.

### **Course Teaching Hours**
