Course Description

This course is an introduction to Ethnomusicology. The aim of this course is to thoroughly acquaint the student with the historical and conceptual resources of the field of ethnomusicology. The course takes a historical and theoretical approach to the development and professionalization of the field, from its late-19th Century European origins to its post-WW II and contemporary contexts. Emphasis is placed on the emergence of ethnomusicology as interdisciplinary field that involves field research, use of oral and literate sources, basic laboratory transcription and analysis, and interpretive techniques.
