## **Course Description**

The aims of the course are to introduce to the students to the management of care of patients in childbearing and in childrearing families. The interrelationship of the biological, psychological, sociocultural and spiritual dimensions; human needs; life cycle; health; and nursing are considered in management of care. Critical thinking skills are applied and enhanced through the use of management of care and exploration of the legal/ethical dilemmas when caring for patients and their families. Introduction to professional nursing issues and practices is integrated throughout the course with emphasis on the planning and implementing aspects of the nursing process. Effective, therapeutic and technological communications skills are employed. The course format is 5h/week lectures, 2.2h/week learning experience

### **Topic Areas**

- I. Integral Aspects of Nursing Management
  - 1. Caring, comforting, communicating; ending professional relationship
  - 2. Teaching patients and family; health promotion across the life span; children accident prevention. Mental health-physical health interface.
  - 3. Developing practitioner: role of assessment and goal setting.

#### II. Legal Issues

 Data protection Act. Equal Opportunity Law and Nursing. Government policy in relation to families, users and carers.

#### III. Professional/Ethical Issues

- 4. Autonomy of the older people, people with disabilities
- 5. Maternity and Reproductive Ethics (ante-, during and post natal care).
- 6. Professional/ Ethical issues in child care. Children's Act.
- 7. Legal/Ethical and Professional frameworks related to Mental Health and Community Care.

#### Conferencing

During conferencing there are student presentations or discussions of the fundamental knowledge and skills the student must develop with reference to specific examples of how the knowledge is applied.

- 1. Communication skills (including for later life); breakaway techniques.
- 2. The family nursing process: leading, managing and influencing change.
- 3. Family communication, patterns and processes (power, roles, values).
- 4. Preparing patient for hospitalization; preparation to go home.
- 5. Care of clients expressing acute and chronic health conditions; teaching families to care.
- 6. Autism and dealing with social self-expression.
- 7. Multi-agency care for disabilities; advocacy and vulnerable people.
- 8. Pain relief management during pregnancy.
- 9. Observation assessment in nursery.
- 10. Mental health care settings. Assessment and planning of mental health care.
- 11. Challenging behavior Management of psychiatric emergency.
- 12. Use efficiently resources and learn to collaborate in the management of client care plan.

Research Paper: Students can write a 2-3 page papers (6 in total) on a chosen Conference topic of the week or a 6-7 page research paper (3 in total) with references.
