Course Description

This course provides a general analysis of the contemporary international system and the forces that mould relationships between states and other groups at an international level. The course focuses on international politics and relations in this twentieth century. Three approaches are briefly examined. Firstly the 'realist' power politics, which has dominated the events of this century in terms of power, resources and wealth. The second approach is the 'structuralist' approach which describes how international frameworks control the distribution of wealth and power. The third approach is that of the 'pluralists'. This attempts to explain world events at an individual level, rather than from a power or structure level.

The course aims to provide the student with a greater understanding of the many factors that have moulded the world system, in order to give them an overview of the social, political and economic forces that have influenced twentieth century history and the contemporary international system.
