Course Aims and Objectives

The course aims to introduce students to in-depth descriptions and analyses of rural and urban societies in the E. Mediterranean. There will be a bias towards Greece, and Cyprus, but reference will also be made to the Balkans, to Spain, Portugal, Italy, to Turkey, as well the societies of the Maghreb. The key theoretical issues to be addressed will include – the symbolic coherence of pre-modern rural communities; economic, social and political transformation resulting from capitalist integration, gender separations and convergences; ethnic, religious and cultural diversity, and the problems of minority identities and hegemonic nationalism; religion and the challenge of secularization; migrations; social impact of war and the process of post-war re-construction. At the end of the course, students should have a grounded knowledge of how societies in the region have been transformed in the past 75 years. They will also have absorbed key features of modern anthropological and sociological theoretical frameworks.

Teaching Methods

Interactive lectures, discussions, student summary presentations of required readings.
